## Adjective, Adverb, and Article Rules



### Activity 1

#### A. Adjectives

- ▶ 1. **Adjectives** describe a noun or a pronoun. Adjectives tell: how many, how much, what kind, and which one.
2. Adjectives can be found before or after nouns
3. Adjectives give more information about a noun or pronoun. They tell how many, how much, what kind, and which one.
4. **Comparative adjectives** compare two people or things. Look for the word *than* in sentences comparing two people or things.
5. **Superlative adjectives** compare three or more people or things. Look for the word *the* in sentences comparing three or more people or things.
6. Sometimes, **irregular adjectives** are used to compare things.
7. An **adjective clause** functions as an adjective. It begins with a relative pronoun (who, whom, whose, that, which) and has a verb. The noun that the clause describes comes directly before the clause.
