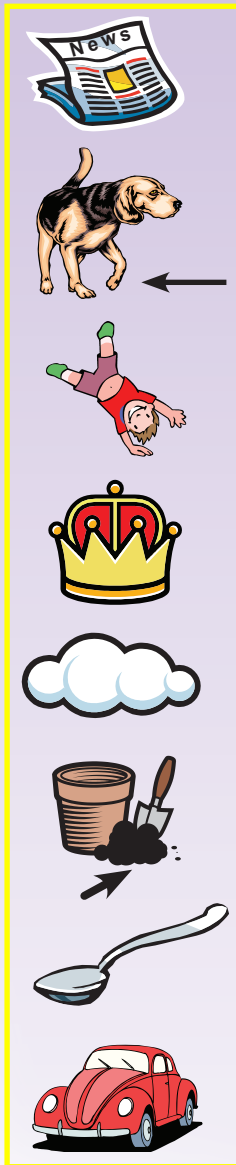


Vowel Diphthongs

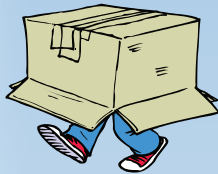
Verbs

Walked shows action, so walked is a verb.



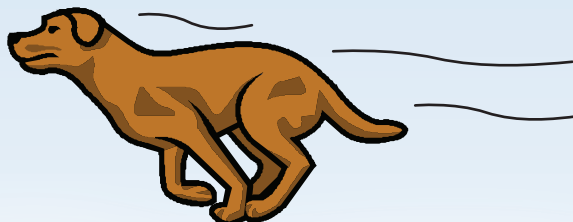

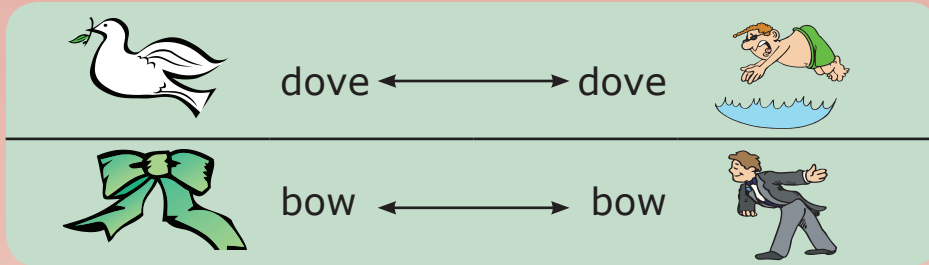
